Survivors' & Dependents' Benefits

Dependency and Indemnity Compensation

For a survivor to be eligible for Dependency & Indemnity Compensation (DIC), the Veteran's death must have resulted from one of the following causes:

- 1 A disease or injury incurred or aggravated in the line of duty while on active duty or active duty for training.
- 2 An injury, heart attack, cardiac arrest, or stroke incurred or aggravated in the line of duty while on inactive duty for training.
- 3– A service-connected disability or a condition directly related to a service-connected disability.

DIC also may be paid to certain survivors of Veterans who were totally disabled from service-connected conditions at the time of death, even though their service-connected disabilities did not cause their deaths. The survivor qualifies if the Veteran was:

- 1 Continuously rated totally disabled for a period of 10 years immediately preceding death; or
- 2 Continuously rated totally disabled from the date of military discharge and for the last 5 years immediately preceding death; or
- 3 A former POW who died after September 30, 1999, and who was continuously rated disabled for a period of at least one year immediately preceding death.

There is also a program called Parents' DIC. The VA provides an income-based monthly benefit to the surviving parent(s) of a servicemember or Veteran whose death was service-related. When countable income exceeds the limit set by law, no benefits are payable. The spouse's income must also be included if living with a spouse. A spouse may be the other parent of the deceased Veteran, or a spouse from remarriage. Unreimbursed medical expenses may be used to reduce countable income. Benefit rates and income limits change annually. DIC ends at midnight of the date of remarriage if a widow is under age 57, after age 57, the martial status does not affect this benefit.

Death Pension




The VA provides pensions to low-income surviving spouses and unmarried children of a deceased Veteran with wartime service. To be eligible, spouses must not have remarried and children must be under age 18, or under age 23 if attending a VA-approved school, or have become permanently incapable of self-support because of disability before age 18. The Veteran must have been discharged under conditions other that dishonorable and must have had 90 days or more of active military service, at least one day of which was during a period of war, or a service-connected disability justifying discharge. Longer periods of service may be required for Veterans who entered active duty on or after September 8, 1980, or October

16, 1981, if an officer. If the Veteran died in service but not in the line of duty, the death pension may be payable if the Veteran completed at least two years of honorable service.

Burial and Memorial Benefits for Survivors

The Department of Veterans Affairs offers several burial and memorial benefits for eligible survivors and dependents. These benefits may include internment at a state or national Veterans cemetery, plot, marker and more.





Survivors' & Dependents' Educational Assistance

The VA provides educational assistance to qualifying dependents as follows:

- 1 The spouse or child of a servicemember or Veteran who either died of a service-connected disability, or who has a permanent and total service-connected disability, or who died while such disability existed.
- 2 The spouse or child of a servicemember listed for more than 90 days as currently Missing In Action (MIA), captured in the line of duty by a hostile force, or detained or interned by a foreign government or power.
- 3 The spouse or child of a servicemember who is hospitalized or is receiving outpatient care or treatment for a disability that is determined





Surviving spouses lose eligibility if they remarry before age 57 or are living with another person who has been held out publicly as their spouse. They can regain eligibility if their remarriage ends by death or divorce or if they cease living with the person. Dependent children do not lose eligibility if the surviving spouse remarries. The period of eligibility of Veterans' spouses expires 10 years from either the date they became eligible or the date of the Veterans' death. VA may grant an extension. Children generally must be between the ages of 18 and 26 to receive educational benefits, though extensions may be granted. The period of eligibility for spouses of

servicemembers who died on active duty expires 20 years from the date of death. This is a change in law that became effective December 10, 2004. Spouses of servicemembers who died on active duty whose 10-year eligibility period expired before December 10, 2004, now have 20 years from that date of death to use educational benefits. Effective October 10, 2008, Public Law 110-389 provides a 20-year period of eligibility for spouses of Veterans with a permanent and total service-connected disability rating effective within 3 years of release from active duty.

VA Home Loan Guaranty

A VA loan guaranty to acquire a home may be available to an unmarried spouse of a Veteran or servicemember who died as a result of service-connected disabilities, a surviving spouse who remarries after age 57, or to a spouse of a servicemember officially listed as MIA or who is currently a POW for more than 90 days. Spouses of those listed MIA/POW are limited to one loan.



"No-Fee" Passports



"No-fee" passports are available to immediate family members (spouse, children, parents, brothers, and sisters) for the expressed purpose of visiting their loved one's grave or memorialization site at an American military cemetery on foreign soil. 
Veterans Benefits Seminar & Health Screenings

Honor Flight Q & A

★ What is Honor Flight of South Carolina? Honor Flight of South Carolina is part of the Honor Flight Network, which ★ takes World War II Veterans to Washington, D.C., to see and experience their WWII memorial. A chartered flight takes 🕏 the Veterans to our nation's capital for a one-day tour. In addition to visiting the WWII memorial, Veterans see the 😓 ★ Korean, Vietnam and Iwo Jima memorials and monuments. The Veterans are special guests at Arlington Cemetery ★ where they observe the Changing of The Guard at the Tomb of The Unknowns.

* When is the next trip? The next scheduled Honor Flight, sponsored by The Electric Cooperatives of South Carolina, will depart Columbia, S.C. on April 11, 2012. The flight leaves Columbia by 8 a.m. and returns around 8 p.m.

* Who is eligible? Any American Veteran who served in the armed forces during World War II who has not previously been on an Honor Flight. Preference will be given to members of electric cooperatives and their families, but all Veterans are urged to apply.

How are South Carolina's electric cooperatives participating in Honor Flight? Electric CO-ODS in S.C. have ★ donated the money to make this trip possible.

How much does the trip cost? There is no cost to Veterans. The flight is funded through donations by South ☆ Carolina's electric cooperatives.

Can I go if I have special medical needs? Yes. Arrangements can be made for most special needs, including wheelchair bound and oxygen dependent individuals. Several physicians will be on the flight to assist the Veterans throughout the day. We encourage all Veterans to apply.

Can my spouse participate? No. However, Veterans may have a guardian. Guardians are the caretakers of the Veterans for the day. Spouses are not permitted to be guardians, but other family members are.

Can another member of my family participate? Yes. A child, grandchild, niece, nephew, or other family members or friends are encouraged to apply to be guardians.

How can I apply? You may mail in the application printed in the January edition of South Carolina Living Magazine, or you can apply online at scliving.coop.

Do I have to provide my own transportation to the airport? Yes. The flight will depart from the Columbia Metropolitan Airport. You will be responsible for your own transportation to and from the airport.

How many seats are available on the trip? There is room for approximately 100 Veterans on the flight.

When will I know if I have been chosen? Applications will be accepted on a first-come, first-served basis. Honor Flight personnel will contact you soon after your application is received.

If I am not chosen for the flight, will I be able to attend a future trip? Yes. There will be another Honor Flight in May of 2012. We will do everything we can to make sure you are a part of that trip. Honor Flight's goal is to give every * WWII Veteran the chance to participate.

Did You Know... The Department of Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) has a new online form to make it easier for grieving family members to report the deaths of military retirees. Instead of having to call and wait on hold for several minutes to report the death of a retiree, the survivor can go to www.dfas.mil and click on Retired Military & Annuitants at the top of the screen. Then on the left side of the screen click on Survivor's and Beneficiaries and then click on Report a Retiree's Death. Just follow the instructions to get to DFAS form 9221. Once DFAS is notified they will stop the retiree's pay to prevent an overpayment and establish any benefits the survivor may be entitled to.




Gibson's Pond in Lexington

Featured Medal:

ARMED FORCES EXPEDITIONARY MEDAL

The Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal (AFEM) is a military award of the United States military, which was first created in 1961 by Executive Order of President John Kennedy. The medal is awarded for participation in "any military campaign of the United States for which no other service medal is authorized." Additional awards of the medal are denoted by service stars, with the arrowhead device also authorized for United States Army personnel who are awarded the medal through participation in an airborne or amphibious assault. The Fleet Marine Force combat operation insignia is also authorized for certain sailors.

Since its original conception over forty years ago, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal has been awarded for United States participation in over forty five designated military campaigns. The first campaign of the AFEM was the Cuban Missile Crisis and the award was issued for military service between October 1962 and June 1963. Following this original issuance, the AFEM was made retroactive to 1958 and issued for actions in Lebanon, Taiwan, Republic of the Congo, Quemoy and Matsu, and for duty in Berlin between 1961 and 1963.





Picture of Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal and Ribbon

During the early years of the Vietnam War, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal was issued for initial operations in South Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia. The Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal was intended to replace the Marine Corps Expeditionary Medal and Navy Expeditionary Medal. In 1965, with the creation of the Vietnam Service Medal, the AFEM was discontinued for Vietnam War service. As the Vietnam Service Medal was retroactively authorized, those personnel who had previously received the AFEM were granted the option to exchange the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal for the Vietnam Service Medal. In 1968, the AFEM was awarded for Naval operations in defense of the USS Pueblo, which was seized by North Korea, as well as for Korean Service, and awarded for Thailand and Cambodia operations in 1973. Because of these awards during the Vietnam war period, some military personnel have been awarded both the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal & the Vietnam Service Medal. After the close of the Vietnam War, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal was issued for various military operations in Panama, Grenada, and Libya Operation El Dorado Canyon. The AFEM has been issued for numerous operations in the Persian Gulf, most notably Operation Earnest Will, which began in 1987 and lasted until the eve of Operation Desert Shield. Following the close of Desert Storm, and the engagement in peacekeeping and sanction missions against Iraq, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal was issued again for several operations such as Operation Northern Watch, Operation Southern Watch, and Operation Vigilant Sentinel. The medal is also authorized for several United Nations actions, such as peacekeeping efforts in Bosnia and Somalia. In 2003, with the creation of the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, the AFEM was discontinued for Iraq, Saudi Arabia, and Kuwait, After 18 March 2003, some personnel became eligible for the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, as well as the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal. Only one medal may be awarded, however, and individuals or units that deployed to the Gulf for Operation Southern Watch, and then immediately transitioned to Operation Iraqi Freedom, are not eligible for both medals.

Beginning in 1992 an effort was begun to phase out the AFEM in favor of campaign specific medals and the newly created Armed Forces Service Medal. To date, however, the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal is still listed on official precedence charts and the award is still considered an active service medal.
